

PROGRAMS ADAPTED TO PANDEMIC



West Ohio CAP implemented new emergency initiatives to address the challenges the COVID-19 Pandemic brought our communities. We quickly overcame obstacles to bridge the gaps, partner with local agencies, and adapt to the changes needed. The agency developed innovative ways to connect and meet the goals of our customers, and we are proud that we were able to continue full operation. We understood the importance of continuing to move forward while keeping the safety and health of our staff and customers our upmost priority. This led to our new protocol which began in March of 2020 with our staff working from home, holding meetings and housing classes virtually, training staff, as well as conducting interviews to continue the hiring process. Many of the classes we hold were held virtually including our parenting classes, financial management and homeownership programs to continue assisting customers in the home-buying process. Head Start teachers provided their students with virtual story time, held Zoom meetings, and conducted lesson plan activities that aligned with the curriculum to ensure the children were staying on track and maintained a positive home and school interaction. Staff and bus drivers delivered weekly meals to our Head Start families with the help of the Ohio Army National Guard, who loaded our buses with food to deliver meals and snacks. This allowed us to distribute food to 216 families, which included our 491 total children. Our staff also provided diapers and other essential items to families in need. WOCAP actively responded to the crisis, thanks to supplies donated from COHHIO to our region and we were able to give supplies to Allen, Auglaize and Mercer County shelters and agencies. Supplies included: cleaning supplies, hand soap, masks, gloves, and toilet paper. West Ohio CAP also provided non-congregate shelter to vulnerable populations who needed to properly quarantine or isolate to prevent the spread of the COVID-19 virus in shelters and our communities. Financial support from the United Way COVID-19 Relief and Response fund and other partners, West Ohio CAP was able to serve this population to keep them safe and healthy through hotel placements. Our partnership with Family Promise provided these individuals with case management services as well. There were 73 households consisting of 117 adults and 48 children who were assisted with hotel placements. A total of 90 food boxes were delivered to customers who were staying in hotels due to the effects of the pandemic.. We experienced a larger number of those in need of our services. 654 customers were assisted with rent/mortgage assistance in the months of November and December through the Home Relief Grant for individuals and families who were affected by the COVID-19 pandemic totaling \$879, 915. Our initiatives have continued into 2021.





FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT

Financial Management is designed to teach participants to take control of their finances to secure economic stability through education about family budgeting, savings, and behaviors that affect financial stability. Each participant becomes a coinvestigator of his or her own financial behaviors. A co-investigator is a person that works with the group's facilitator to investigate and study financial issues that affect them. As a whole, the group investigates the process of changing financial spending habits. During this investigation, participants discuss ways to build personal wealth. Participants also investigate causes of wealth and poverty. West Ohio CAP served 28 participants in the Financial Management Program in the year 2020.

RENT/MORTGAGE ASSISTANCE

Households were helped by direct Rent/ Mortgage Housing Assistance for housing needs. WOCAP is part of the Balance of State Continuum of Care (BOSCOC). The objective of the BOSCOC is to address issues of homelessness in the State of Ohio. The State is divided into regions and West Ohio CAP is the agency lead of region 12 which includes Allen, Auglaize, and Mercer Counties. The HCRP program has two components. One is the homeless prevention piece which provides assistance to customers who are imminently at risk of losing their primary nighttime residence within 14 days. The other piece is to rapidly re-house customers who are literally homeless or living in a place not fit for human habitation.

HOMEOWNERSHIP

west Ohio CAP is a HUD Certified Housing Counseling Agency that provides pre-purchase counseling and 12 hours of homeownership classes that identify the process in which homeownership is accomplished. The program provides up to \$6,000 for a 1st-time homebuyer purchasing within the City of Lima. A total of 8 families purchased homes in 2020 with a total real estate sales value of \$602,723, and has helped 706 families become homeowners since its existence.

FAIR HOUSING

This program provides Fair Housing Services for the City of Lima, Allen County and Mercer County. The services include receiving Fair Housing complaints, providing information, training and educational material to the community. West Ohio CAP received 354 calls regarding Fair Housing. 1 Civil Rights complaint was filed in 2020.

EMERGENCY HOME REPAIR

LEAD SAFE HOME PROGRAM

LEAD SAFE HOME PROGRAM

The Lead Safe Home Program offers assistance to low and moderate income families, or rental property owners, in making their home lead-safe for children. Five homes were completed through services provided by this program. The program is offered in Allen, Auglaize, Hardin, Mercer, Paulding, Putnam, Van Wert, and Wood Counties. Income-eligible households with children under the age of six or who have an adult who is pregnant can apply for the program, receive licensed lead abatement services to the property, and the home repairs needed to keep them safely in their home.

EMERGENCY HOME REPAIR PROGRAM

West Ohio CAP's Emergency Home Repair
Program provides forgivable grants of up to
\$7,500 to eligible homeowners who are in need
of emergency repairs/handicapped accessibility
modifications so they can remain in their home.
Homeowners must be below 50% of the Area
Median Income and reside in one of the
following counties: Allen, Auglaize, Hancock,
Mercer and Putnam Counties.

DIRECT SUPPORT

The Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP) assists elderly and low-income families with seasonal utility bills to avoid utility shut-off. the Winter program runs November through March, and the Summer program from July through August. West Ohio CAP works with consumers to establish eligibility and submit applications for this assistance. The average cost of assistance per case was over \$2,000.

HEALTH & SOCIAL/BEHAVIORAL DEVELOPMENT

RX/AIM

is an Emergency Prescription Assistance Program that assists elderly and low-income residents who are without insurance or cannot afford medication. Customers can only be served once in a 12 month period

MVP: MOST VALUABLE PARENT PROGRAM

is a free program available to parents of minor children in Allen, Auglaize and Mercer Counties. The MVP Program offers parenting workshops in a group setting that allows parents time to socialize with other parents, discuss topics related to their children and learn ways to relieve stress. 38 individuals completed the program in 2020, fewer than in years past, due to the COVID-19 Pandemic making it difficult to meet for classes.

PART E. RESULTS OF MOST RECENT HEAD START REVIEW

A primary tool used in reviews is the Classroom Assessment Scoring System (CLASS). Tables E1 & E2, below, shows scores from the most recent WOCAP Internal Review. The Classroom Assessment Scoring System (CLASS) is an observation instrument that assesses the quality of teacher-child interactions in center-based classrooms. The system includes 1- "Dimensions" which look at details of teachers' interactions with children. The "Dimensions" are based on developmental theory and research. Assessments are performed by trained and certified observers using a specific protocol. Observers independently rate each dimension on a 7-point scale. A score of 6 or 7 represents consistent, effective teacher-child interaction throughout the observation period. The "Dimensions" are grouped into three categories, called "Domains": Emotional Support, Classroom Organization and Instructional Support. Analysis and discussion of CLASS assessments generally revolves around scores in these three "Domains". The Emotional Support score represents the degree to which teachers establish and promote a positive climate in their classrooms through their everyday interactions. The Classroom Organization score represents routines and procedures related to organizing and managing children's behavior, time, and attention. The Instructional Support score represents ways teachers use the curriculum to promote cognitive and language development.


